


Growing a Moustache

Who Was Salvador Dali

Salvador Dali

(1904-1989)

Spanish

Salvador Dali was painter, sculptor, designer and filmmaker. He was very famous, not just for his artwork, but for his appearance and behaviour. He had an extremely famous moustache, inspired by a Spanish painter called Velazquez. Whenever people saw pictures of the moustache, they would think of Salvador Dali. He had quite long hair and sideburns, often dressing like a Victorian man.

He was a 'Surrealist' artist: his work looked strange and not very realistic. The items in his pictures had different meanings e.g. ants meant 'death'. When Salvador Dali was born, he was named 'Salvador' because this was the name of his older brother, who had died months before. His mother wanted a replacement for her lost son.

He was very interested in Science and Maths. He was influenced by the work of the artists Picasso and Miro.

Does this look familiar?




A cartoonist has made his own image, inspired by Salvador Dali's famous painting.
